- 1. Improving Attendance the more time students spend in school the more likely they are to achieve highly. The significant majority of students in Year 11 in 2022/23 who had over 90% attendance achieved better than the national average progress rate and secured colleges places of choice.
- 2. Addressing the minority of students who have not yet developed good learning habits or do not yet meet our shared behaviour standards, our learning habits are:

Punctuality and attendance

• On task behaviour

Focused learning in class, to ensure we can maximise achievement.


Ethics Debate

Congratulations Mattia on this well-deserved achievement!




This is Me
