

The magic of Shakespeare's The Tempest

Our Year 7 students have begun an exciting new journey into Shakespeare's The Tempest, diving into the play's rich language, memorable characters, and timeless themes. As part of their study, pupils have been developing their ability to translate Shakespearean dialogue into modern English.

This activity that has not only boosted their confidence with unfamiliar vocabulary but has also helped them appreciate the humour, tension, and drama woven throughout the play. Alongside their language work, students have been exploring some of the major themes that shape The Tempest, including power, revenge, colonisation, and forgiveness.



Through class discussion and group activities, they have begun to consider how Prospero controls the island, the consequences of seeking revenge, and the complex relationships between those who rule and those who are ruled. Pupils have also reflected on the play's ultimate movement toward forgiveness and reconciliation, discussing what these ideas might mean in both Shakespeare's world and their own lives. It has been inspiring to see Year 7 engage so thoughtfully with such a challenging text, and we look forward to seeing how their interpretations continue to develop over the term.



Purple Hibiscus - independent character research

Our Year 9 students have made an impressive start to their study of Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie's Purple Hibiscus, with a special commendation for 9A4, who have demonstrated exceptional independence and curiosity in their research. Pupils have been exploring the novel's key characters in depth, gathering contextual insights and analysing how Adichie crafts complex personalities and relationships within the story.



This research has led to some lively and thoughtful debates in class, particularly around character contrasts and the shifting dynamics within the Achike family. Students have engaged critically with themes of authority, freedom, tradition, and personal growth, using evidence from both the text and their independent findings. Their contributions have shown real maturity and insight as they begin preparing for their Cycle 2 assessments.

It has been fantastic to see 9A4 approach their learning with such enthusiasm, independence, and analytical skill. We look forward to seeing how their ideas continue to develop as we move further into the novel.



- **Ongoing post-16 interventions (Mondays and Thursdays):**

Targeted support for students exploring their next steps, ensuring they are prepared and informed about post-16 options.

Winter water safety

In winter, children and pets are particularly at risk when tempted to play on the ice formed on open water, and adults can find themselves at risk in attempting to save them.

Taking a nice walk in cold weather with your family, friends or dogs in tow can be really refreshing, just make sure you know some simple tips on how to stay safe in winter.

Here are some useful tips to keep safe this winter:

KEEP BACK FROM THE EDGE
Keep back from slippery banks.
Stick to well-lit areas and plan your walks in daylight or along well-lit paths.
Never go onto the ice.

KEEP CHILDREN AND DOGS WITHIN REACH
Teach children not to go onto ice.
Keep dogs on a lead near ice and slippery banks.
If out enjoying a winter walk, walk with friends.

IF YOU'RE IN TROUBLE FLOAT AND CALL FOR HELP.
Stay calm, float on your back and call for help.
Wait for help and keep as still as possible.
Preserve heat by pressing your arms by your side and keep your legs together. Keep your head clear of the water.
Throw something that floats to somebody that has fallen in.

CALL 999
Do not enter cold water or ice to rescue.
Try and reach them from the bank using a rope, pole, tree branch, clothing tied together or anything else which can extend your reach.
